The Research Process Explained:

You make your enquiry, we then look to see what information we can find quickly—then we contact you to see if you wish to proceed and advise of the fees.

If you do, we ask for \$30 (or \$35 overseas—to cover extra postage). Once payment is received, we then investigate either your specific queries or start at the beginning and check cemetery records, BDM registers, local registers, school registers, pedigree charts, some shipping, local history books, Gympie Times records, previous cemetery crawl presentations, previous research requests, mining, electoral rolls and so the list goes on.

We hold a lot of various local registers and cuttings and basic items you would find in a local history library. We also have access to the internet and can often suggest websites and ways of searching that you may not have thought of.


We do many hours of ongoing research and then either email the information to you as we go, or mail packets to you so you have the hard copies. We then also keep the information we have researched for you on file and it is then available to future people who may be researching your names too. Many times we have put people in touch with other searchers of their own trees.

Our research people do so much more work than you would realise to help you in your search for information. Please feel confident that everything possible is done by our volunteers to supply you with any relevant information we may have in our library.

The funds raised from your payments for our research, assist us with obtaining further records and to produce books and CD's for easy access of family details in Gympie and the surrounds.

Payment can be by either cheque sent to our P O Box as above or direct deposit into our Bank account is another option for those who feel comfortable with the method. Then we can allocate your payment and get on with the research!

We are very sad to report the loss of one of our long term members,


Keith Parker.

16th May 1891 The Queenslander

[BY TELEGRAPH FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.] WARWICK, May 13.

A woman named Connolly, living in a hovel on the Curragh Mountains, county Waterford, received on 19th March (says the St. James's Gazette) an intimation from a Waterford solicitor that a sum of £2700 had been left her, under the following remarkable circumstances. Thirty years ago, a few days after she had been confined of a girl, her husband disappeared from the Curragh District, and was never again heard of by her. A communication from a Roman Catholic clergyman residing at Brisbane states that Connolly, the missing man, worked his way to Australia, and went to the goldfields, and, having amassed something like £6000 in three years, was returning to Melbourne, when he was attacked by bushrangers and robbed of all he possessed. Being penniless, he returned to the goldfields, and again set to work. About two months ago he reached Brisbane, broken down in health. He was then on his way back to Ireland but he died in a few days, leaving the amount stated to his wife, if alive, and if not, to his daughter. During his thirty years of voluntary exile he never wrote his wife a letter.

{I wonder if this was connected to our Gympie Goldfields at all???? Qld BDM shows John Connolly dying on the 23rd March 1891 about 40 y from Ireland. This may be him.... Ed}

When Widgee went to War 1914-1918:

This is going to be a fantastic way of blending many of our members as we come together to create the memories of Gympie and the Surrounds.

- 1) Do you have any photos or stories of the effects, (before, during and after), the Great War had on the everyday families of Gympie and its surrounding areas known as Widgee Shire. We would love to include them.
- 2) Do you know of anyone who went to war but came home and is buried in the local Gympie Cemetery. We would love to access any photos or stories to include in the crawls. The first of these Digger Crawls is to be held on the **6th August 2014** and we aim to ask some of the local cadets and musicians to assist us with ensuring that these Digger crawls are presented with dignity, respect and heart.
- 3) Does your family have any letters or stories or photos of the War time that you would be happy to share with us for these presentations? We hope to host a series of small presentations. Each one will have two or three detailed personal stories being told of a man and his war, his life and his demise. Perhaps with images on a screen behind the storyteller, and the letters being read by a family member.....

Lyn Fleming is co-ordinating the research process and the people involved are Eric Streat, Lyn Wilson, Val Buchanan, Marjorie Head & Alec Miles.

I am still acting as the co-ordinator for the events and the book, while Lyn Fleming is doing a phenomenal job of keeping us on track and mindful that August is not very far away. Lyn has even been busy planting Poppy Seeds from Flanders along the driveway at the Cemetery (with permission of course) and fingers crossed they come up with their lovely flowers to show our remembrance in August.

Chinese People in Gympie

FROM latest dates of the Nashville Times we summarise the following items - Two nuggets were found yesterday (March 3) afternoon, one weighing twelve ounces and the other eight ounces. They were found in Mr. Hogan's claim in Sailor's Gully, about five claims below that in which the big nugget was found.--A prospecting claim for a new reef, situated about two hundred yards from the junction of White's and Walker's Gully has been granted to Mr Hilton and party. The specimens are reported very favorably of preparations for soap boiling have been commenced the necessary building being in course of erection and a party of Chinese have begun to cultivate a market garden for the supplying of the people of Nashville with vegetables. The Brisbane Courier Mail 10th March 1868

This shows us that Chinese people were in Gympie right from the very beginning of the town as 1868 was the year that it all began. This is part of the reason that we as a local family historical society have had a beautiful brass plaque created at the Gympie Cemetery and have arranged a large sandstone plinth for it to be attached to. It is going to be placed in the pagan section of the cemetery as there are many Chinese people interred there, as well as other nationalities. The plaque has been paid for through a grant that was obtained some years ago by our society.

The plaque is now ready to be set in place and when this is completed we will be arranging an unveiling and light morning tea for anyone interested to come along and be involved. This date will be advised by email and in the Gympie Times—but if you would like to be personally notified as well, please let the secretary know and we will arrange this for you.

We are also wishing to put together a booklet of various articles and stories of the Chinese people in the area and will be incorporating the information already obtained through previous cemetery crawls on a few of the families that are still in the area.

If you have any information that you would like included, please contact the editor with your written copy for inclusion. This inclusion will be at the discretion of the committee.





The story of John Masters

John's headstone reads: John, died 28 April 1901 aged 64 years "My Father"

John Masters was born in 1837 in Linkinhorne, Cornwall, England to William & Mary. He married Anne Dawe Johns, who was just 19, on the 14th September 1865 in their home town. They had a daughter Mary Hannah the following year.

In 1871, John was listed as a copper miner and the family were still living in Linkinhorne. Mary Hannah lost her mother when she was just 5 years old. Only 2 years later, John emigrated to Australia on the 30th June 1873 onboard the "*Countess Russell*". Mary moved in with her aunt Jane Masters and went to school. She was listed on the 1881 English census and they were living at 34 Admiralty St in Linkinhorne. She was 15 by this time.

Mary Hannah came out to join her father sometime after the 1881 census but prior to the 10th May 1886 as this was when she married Samuel Henry Rowe. The baby Rowe's began in July 1887 and went through to the last one being born in 1907. The 1895 electoral roll shows John as living Elizabeth St, Gympie and he was mining. He was still there in 1900. The Rowe family were also in Elizabeth St in 1905 so perhaps Mary inherited the home as she was also the recipient of John's £650 after he died on the 28th April 1901.

John was not alone in Gympie although he did not appear to remarry. His sister Amelia married Henry BUTTRESS in Linkinhorne in 1875 and followed her brother in 1876. She raised her family here in Gympie at Red Hill and are also buried here in Gympie.

He also had a family friend here in Joseph REATH. Joseph was a lodger in the home of William Masters in 1861 in Cornwall and was 21 years old as was John. Joseph came out to Australia first as he was married before February 1872. Joseph is also buried here on his own as is John. Joseph lost one of his sons and his daughter-in-law in the ship, the "*SS Yongala*" which sunk off the coast in the Great Barrier Reef in 1911. All people on the vessel were lost and they have only just recently located the wreck. {The Reath story is in the Cemetery Crawl book #24}.

William Augustine DARMODY

William was born in Croydon, Nth Qld on 19th July, 1897 to John DARMODY and Catherine Teresa LONG. His mother died in March, 1898 as a result of the fever and his father was left to raise William as well as two older sons and two older daughters. William was taken in by Mrs Proberts who fostered him for some time. William's father was employed by Queensland Railway as a ganger on the Normanton to Croydon line which meant many changes of address. The family moved from Croydon to Bororen and then Toolooa in Central Queensland.

After several transfers the family moved to Walloon in South Qld when William started work in the railways as a Lad Porter in 1911 aged 14. This took him to several places including Torbanlea where he was promoted to Night Officer. There was no hotel in Torbanlea so to quench his thirst he would travel to the next town, Howard, where he met Florence Elizabeth LOWRY, who was the hotelier's daughter and who was very hospitable, we believe.

William and Florence were married in Brisbane's St Stephens Cathedral on 15th February 1926. William's first appointment as a married person was Toogoolawah in May 1926, then Einasleigh in far North Queensland in December 1926. In January 1927 Cairns and the hinterland was hit by a tremendous cyclone and resulting flood which destroyed several bridges closing the rail line and resulting in the transfer of William south. There was no form of transport except motorized trolleys on which they travelled to Alma Den where they were able to board a train bound for Cairns and then South. In June 1930 William was transferred to Kingaroy as Assistant Station Master, where they stayed until February 1933 when William was promoted to Station Master at Imbil. William was struck down by a serious illness needing urgent surgery in Gympie. Unfortunately he did not survive and passed away on 24th October, 1935. He was buried here the following day, aged 38. William left a family of 3 boys and one girl and his last child, a son, was born on 6th December, 1935, two months later.
