The Research Process Explained:

You make your enquiry, we then look to see what information we can find quickly—then we contact you to see if you wish to proceed and advise of the fees.

If you do, we ask for \$25 (or \$30 overseas—to cover extra postage). Once payment is received, we then investigate either your specific queries or start at the beginning and check cemetery records, BDM registers, local registers, school registers, pedigree charts, some shipping, local history books, Gympie Times records, previous cemetery crawl presentations, previous research requests, mining, electoral rolls and so the list goes on.

We hold a lot of various local registers and cuttings and basic items you would find in a local history library. We also have access to the internet and can often suggest websites and ways of searching that you may not have thought of.

We do many hours of ongoing research and then either email the information to you as we go, or mail packets to you so you have the hard copies. We then also keep the information we have researched for you on file and it is then available to future people who may be researching your names too. Many times we have put people in touch with other searchers of their own trees.

Our research people do so much more work than you would realise to help you in your search for information. Please feel confident that everything possible is done by our volunteers to supply you with any relevant information we may have in our library.

The funds raised from your payments for our research, assist us with obtaining further records and to produce books and CD's for easy access of family details in Gympie and the surrounds.

Payment can be by either cheque sent to our P O Box as above or direct deposit into our Bank account is another option for those who feel comfortable with the method. Details of our bank account are: BSB 645646 Account# 101763948 and is with Wide Bay Australia. We ask that you confirm by email to gfh@spiderweb.com.au. if possible when you have made the payment. Then we can allocate your payment and get on with the research!

I have just taken the time to watch the Video of Chris Paton who is lecturing on our Cruise on Scottish records. (Video Link is on Lower right of the web page). If you have Scottish background or want to know more about Scottish records it is worth spending the 15 minutes to watch the video. Clear speech, (not a hard to understand Scottish brogue) and good information. (I have no Scottish background, but found the information worthwhile – I am particularly interested to know that his guides as well as other Genie books are now available as e-books from <http://www.gen-ebooks.com/>) and also Unlock the Past / Gould Genealogy

Chris Paton explains that Scottish records were controlled by Scottish Law so there are many differences to what we know of how UK/English records were created. Sure its a sales pitch, but for individual researchers and / or Genealogical Society's a wealth of information is available.. I sure hope other lecturers on the Cruise are at least as easy to listen to as Chris Paton. These are the people who will help us. Along the way we may even be able to benefit our own research.

You may even decide to go on one of the Cruises. Chris mentions the 2014 /15 Cruises happening in the Northern Hemisphere. I am sure if you tune into the above website from time to time you will find information videos by some of the other lecturers on the Cruise. Also it is going to be interesting to see what records around the world are converted to e-books in the near future. Lots of resources already available through Gould Genealogy under the Archive CD Books labelling. Gould is a very trustworthy supplier.

Cemetery Crawl report

The next crawl is on the 19th March 2014 and I have yet to plan it. So any suggestions are certainly more than welcome.

As mentioned in the last newsletter, there was thought of heading down into the Welsh and Jewish areas as the weather had been so dry. Usually we struggle to get that far down in the cemetery as it gets very boggy and wet underfoot with just a little bit of rain. We had 25 or so book in and as per usual about 45 turned up. This is fine except that it creates a little bit of concern as to whether there will be enough books printed.

We covered the whole Jewish area even though John Nathan had done quite a lot of research back in the early years when some of them were previously presented in an early crawl. I had also researched some of the Jewish people and their stories were in a recent Researcher newsletter as well. But also of interest was that there is a little section in the cemetery called the Hope of Israel and so two of the families were researched and shared. The rest of the stories were on some of the Methodist families that are in the area and this led to some very interesting discussions. One of the families (PACEY) was Methodist but interestingly, there is a Freemason symbol on the headstone and a few of the crawlers expressed surprise as it is not a common mix of Methodist and Freemason. I have included their story further in the newsletter and there is a query on a second symbol on the headstone which is very curious too. If you know what it is—please let me know. Di

PACEY MPC 97 & 98

This headstone reads: Richard Pacey, Rose Pacey and shows two symbols. The first one is the Square and Compass which is the Freemasonry symbol and the other is not yet identified.



Actually buried here are four people at least. Rose & Richard Pacey as well as one of their sons, Richard and also John Sydney Pacey.

Richard PACEY married Rose SLEAFORD on the very last day of 1896. Richard was 29 while his bride was just 16. Perhaps there was a connection from Lincolnshire as Richard was born in Ewerby and Ewerby road runs into the middle of the township of Sleaford. Sleaford is also where the train line from Heighington (Rose's area) ran into. Perhaps it was just the connection of "people from back home" that brought them together.

They began their family with Frank being born a few months later on the 26th June 1897. Richard followed in November 1897. Richard was born on the 8th but sadly his older brother Frank died a few days later on the 20th. What a mixture of joy and sadness for Rose and Richard to welcome a little one in and then to say goodbye to their other baby.

Their family grew a few years later with Arthur Robert in 1902, John William in 1904, Joseph Jackson in 1907, Alice in 1911 and Jane in 1913.

By 1903, the electoral roll shows that the Pacey family was living in Rifle Range and Richard was a labourer. The Sleaford family was based at Deep Creek and some of Rose's brothers had moved up to Apple-tree Creek.

1913 shows Richard & Rose had moved to Ranson Rd and Rose's family had begun to drift away to Gladstone and Rosewood. However her brother Edward took up mining and became married and lived in Laurie Lane in Gympie so Rose still had some family nearby.

1922 shows that Richard and Rose remained in Ranson Road while their son Richard had headed slightly north to Childers where he was also labouring like his father. His uncle Edward Sleaford was farming a property called "Sunnyside" at Bauple while most of the rest of the Sleaford family spread to Mount Morgan and Rosewood.

Sadly Richard died (the father) on the 5th April 1923. He was 56 years old. The Gympie Times on the 10th April tells more of Richard. "When Mr R Pacey, overseer of the Gympie City Council, was forced to cease work about 3 weeks ago, and seek medical advice, nobody thought he was so near his end. He became a patient in hospital but his condition failed to improve and on Saturday he passed away at just 59 years of age. He had for 29 years been an employee of the GCC and recently took over the duties of overseer. He is survived by a

widow and family of seven children—three still attending school. One son was at the front in the Great War. The funeral on Sunday was largely attended, the GCC being represented by the Alderman, the PAFSOA and Father association by their members. The service at the graveside was preached by the Rev J E Everett.” {Protestant Alliance Friendly Society Of Australia}

He was also a member of the Freemason's as the symbol on the headstone shows. The 1934 electoral roll does list Jane still living in Ranson road although the rest of her family was listed as living in Pacey St. It is most likely that the house was on the corner of Ranson and Pacey. Her sons Richard (a labourer), John (a clerk) and Arthur (a clerk), together with Alice (a shop assistant) were all living in Pacey St. The other son Joseph Jackson (a railway employee) and his wife Nellie Essie, were living in Musgrave St which is not very far away from the rest of the family.

Rose passed away in 1938 and is buried here with her husband , son and John Sydney Pacey.

The boys died in the following order: Arthur in 1953, Richard in 1955 and John in 1962. The Gympie Times reports on the 27th September 1955 the story of Richard's passing. "A 46 year old railway fettler was found dead in Bent St early Saturday morning. He was Richard Pacey, single of Pacey St. The Ambulance brigade was notified by Douglas Blaik of Bent St when he saw Pacey's body lying in the gutter. An ambulance bearer pronounced life extinct. There are no suspicious circumstances." Richard was the son mentioned in his fathers story who fought in the Great War. It also appears through various newspaper reports that there was an R Pacey who was a very active sportsman in Gympie, playing rugby.

Also buried here is John Sydney Pacey who died in 1947. His father was George Pacey and so was the grandson of Richard and Rose.

The PACEY arrival into Australia seems to begin with Richard coming on his own into Maryborough on the "Duke of Sutherland" on the 28th December 1886 when he was just 19. Richard was born into a farming family in 1867 as his father Frank was an agricultural labourer. Richards mother died in late 1879 when he was about 12 years old. As well as other younger siblings, he had a little sister born in early 1878 called Rose so the family would have been very busy with out the mother of the family.

The SLEAFORD family was composed of Joseph and his wife Jane, together with Robert Arthur, Kate, Rose, Edward, Naomi, Ada and Joseph. They lived in Lincolnshire and Joseph was an ironstone miner. The family decided to come to Australia, the land of milk and honey and arrived into Maryborough on the 3rd February 1888 onboard the "Duke of Argyll". Coming from winter in England to summer in Queensland must have been very trying for all of the families. When she arrived, Rose was about eight years old.

Therefore we are going to re-trace our steps on SATURDAY 15th March 2014.

The cost will still be \$40 for the bus including the book. We can only have 32 on the bus so be quick to book it. I anticipate an 8.30 start and back by about 4pm (all being well). Last time we had an amazing lunch supplied by a local company and many people who brought their own, vowed to "not bother" next time when they saw the spread we put out. This is a separate cost of \$15.

When Widgee went to War 1914-1918:

Since the previous newsletter was sent out, this project has grown massively.

As we know, war was declared on the 4th August 1914 and the boys signed up in droves.

As 2014 is the beginning of the 100 year anniversary of this event that created such changes in peoples lives, our Society has decided to embark on research and events as are many other groups and societies. However our aims are slightly different. We intend to accomplish the following and encourage anyone who is interested to come and be involved.

- 1) A book sharing the effects, (before, during and after), the Great War had on the everyday families of Gympie and its surrounding areas known as Widgee Shire. This will include the lead up to the declaration, the call to arms, the advertisements, the marches, the dances, the fund raising, the comfort boxes, the letters from family members and the little bits of stories that need to be recorded for the future. This book will be launched around the 4th August 2014 and will then be available for schools and other societies to use as a reference. Also for the families of Widgee Shire in memory of their men (and boys) who went away, many who never returned, and to honour those who came home. This book will also include a list of the men who enlisted and this will then lead onto the next part of GFHS journey.
- 2) The GFHS is aiming to then create a series of “The Gympie Diggers” Cemetery Crawls (both local and on tour) to present the stories of some of the men who did come home and are buried in either our Gympie Cemetery or in a surrounding one. These crawls will also include some memorials of those who didn’t come home but their names are included on the family headstones. The first of these Digger Crawls is to be held on the 6th August 2014 and we aim to ask some of the local cadets and musicians to assist us with ensuring that these Digger crawls are presented with dignity, respect and heart.
- 3) From the list of men mentioned in the book above, we are already beginning the process of finding the files of those who enlisted and we will be constructing a family tree for each consisting of spouse, siblings and parents as well as occupations. We are not concentrating on the actual battles and war details as they are already easily accessible on the Australian War Memorial website and many other places as well. These files all contain the stories of the person, their letters from home, their deaths or injuries, their overseas marriages, their heroism and their convictions. These files then will be used to create a series of books “Snapshots of Widgee at War—the stories of the soldiers” and these files and books will be continually added to over the years as more information comes to light and people contribute to the files.
- 4) From these files will also emerge a series of small presentations. Each one will have two or three detailed personal stories being told of a man and his war, his life and his demise. Perhaps with images on a screen behind the storyteller, and the letters being read by a family member.....

Lyn Fleming has begun the research process and we now have a group consisting of Eric Streat, Faye Kennedy, Val Buchanan & Marjorie Head putting together information on our local diggers. We are looking for people interested in doing the family tree research and the electoral roll searches after the files have

been put together. We are putting guidelines in place so that we have uniform research techniques and it is very nice to see people working together so well.

I am acting as the co-ordinator for the events and the book so if you have any queries, please feel free to come into the rooms and volunteer to help out or just to ask. Lyn Fleming is also more than happy to show you how to research the servicemen and what is required. Stationery is supplied but we are currently applying for funding to continue this work and we may then be able to assist with internet usage—however we do have three computers at the rooms which are on line and you are more than welcome to come down and set yourself up and start researching.

We have supplied some USB sticks to those helping so that the records can be stored on them and then printed out at the rooms to help with ink.

This is a perfect opportunity for anyone who is interested in the dossiers of the servicemen, has a few hours to spare and would like to be involved in preserving our war time heritage. - Come along to a meeting or simply pop in and have a chat to express your interest.

We received a grant towards the printing of a book about the Chinese community in Gympie. For many various reasons this has never been completed. The money is still in the bank waiting

As a committee, we have decided that this needs to be finalised. After much discussion, it has been decided that there is no need at the moment to put together a book about the various Chinese families who were so much a part of the community. Some of the families have been written about in other locations and we would like to put them together at some stage.

However until then, we are going to put together a booklet with as much information as we can about general every day things that were attributed to the Chinese peoples living here. They were market gardeners and fed much of the population. They had ingenious water lifts, had laundry wash houses (in fact I have been told that my shop at 53-55 Mary St was a Chinese Laundromat at some stage in the early years) and of course worked the goldfields.

So if anyone has general information, especially photographs or reports or stories in writing about this group of peoples, we would very much appreciate you contacting us. We would like this to be finalised by Chinese New Year in February 2014 if possible so PLEASE ACT QUICKLY.

The other thing that we are working on in regards to this Grant is a plaque to be placed on a large sandstone rock in the Pagan area of the Gympie Two Mile Cemetery to acknowledge the Chinese people who were buried there and also in Tozer Park Rd.

It will be a bronze plaque and we are looking to have something like the following wording on it, together with an etched picture.

If anyone has any objections to the following wording, please let us know ASAP.

This plaque is placed in acknowledgment of the huge contribution made by the Chinese community during the formation of our town, Gympie, and the surrounding areas.

From the very beginning to the current day.

Many of their descendants still remain here.
